1 Native shrubs

Shrubs such as blackthorn, field maple, hazel and hawthorn will provide food and cover for mammals, birds and insects and link to surrounding trees encouraging wildlife further into the park.

2 Community Food Growing

A growing space for fruit, vegetables and flowers, close to the youth centre and community centre. Come and learn how to grow or share your experience with others.

3 Blossom trees

A group of blossom trees, such as wild cherry and crab apple, will make a more welcoming entrance space to the buildings. Birds will feast on the berries in the autumn.

During 2023-24 The Parks Foundation in partnership with BCP Council will be making further changes to Muscliff Park.

Following on from the Green Recovery work during 2022, these additional enhancements will bring people closer to nature and help wildlife thrive.

5 New signage

New welcome signage in front of the youth centre and directional fingerposts along the path to the north indicating longer circular walks into the countryside.

4 Carpet of spring flowers

A welcome splash of colour after winter! Spring flowers will provide an important source of nectar for insects early in the year and a more welcoming entrance area in front of the buildings.



Installed throughout the park, these nesting boxes will help our local bats and birds thrive.
