GREEN HEART PARK SHERBORN CRESCENT

1 Native shrubs and hedges

Planting of native shrubs will provide refuge and nesting sites for songbirds and small mammals. The berries of hawthorn and blackthorn, and the nuts of hazel are a great source of food for them too.

2 A carpet of spring flowers

Here we will clear the non-native shrubs and plant spring flowering bulbs.
Bluebells, anemones, cowslip and daffodils will provide an important source of nectar for insects early in the year.

3 Mini-wetland

By creating a shallow depression we create a place to feed for birds which find lots of beetles and bugs in the wet muddy ground. Keep your eyes peeled for dragonflies and damselflies!

4 Grassy meadow

Great for bees, beetles and butterflies! This meadow will provide a home for our pollinators to feed and shelter in.

During 2023-24 The Parks Foundation in partnership with BCP Council will be making changes to Sherborn Park.


